Schoolchildren in Vermont are at high risk for contracting a tickborne disease. According to the CDC, the highest Lyme disease infection rates occur in children, ages 5 to 14. Of the over 300,000 people infected in the U.S. each year, one in four is a child.

In addition to well-known symptoms such as joint pain, fever, and a "bulls-eye" rash** children may have a unique presentation of tickborne disease, including:

- Mood Swings
- Vision Problems
- Headaches and Stomachaches
- Hyperactivity/ADHD Symptoms
- Autism-like Behaviors
- Oppositional Behaviors
- Self-Mutilating Behaviors
- Learning Disabilities
- Trouble with Processing Speed and Memory

- Vocal/Motor Tics
- Sudden Onset Anxiety Disorders
- Light and Sound Sensitivity
- Difficulty Focusing
- Obsessive Compulsive Behaviors
- Dark circles under eyes
- Irregular Rashes
- Lethargy
- Sudden Changes in Behavior

**The Vermont Department of Health's 2014 Lyme Surveillance Report showed less than half of Vermont children with a confirmed case of Lyme disease had a "Bulls-Eye" rash.

Prevention and **early diagnosis** will help Vermont's children stay healthy and prevent longterm health complications from a tickborne disease.
